more details, see P4.)

The remaining new LED light fixtures have arrived and we're awaiting Welsbach Electric to install them. Forty eight new fixtures will be installed throughout the Village on the existing poles to replace old ones and to improve visibility at night.

As noted on the front page, at our last Organizational meeting, we asked residents to vote on their favorite of three different signs. We had a clear winner! We are just in the process of making a few minor adjustments to be in compliance with NYS regulations and after that, installation of the signs will begin. Naturally, this is an expensive undertaking, so we are spreading costs between two fiscal years. We expect all streets to have new signs by end of 2019.

We continue our work at the Brookville Nature Park. Next up is the installation of an electronic gate and security cameras. (Much of this expense is covered through parkland grants that we have worked to obtain.) The new gate will improve the aesthetics of the entrance and allow the park to be closed at dusk. Slated for our September calendar this year, we will celebrate Safety Month in the Park. This free event will be open to all residents. You will get a chance to meet with new members of your Police and Fire Departments. See P3 for details.

I'm proud to announce that the OBPD has hired another Police Officer in a series of new hires to replace those officers who have retired. It's sad to say "goodbye" to so many familiar faces, but nice we have qualified officers to replace them. (See P9.)

If you live on or off Wheatley Road, you will notice that the Jericho Water District has started their water tank replacement project. The existing 10" cast iron water main on the property was replaced with a new 16" iron water main. Once the contract is finalized they will begin work to erect the new tower. (See P7 for details.)

As the weather gets nicer, I want to again focus on property maintenance — especially

broken fences and downed trees. There are unsightly fences all around the Village, but some of the worst are on Rte.107. Please mend them in a timely fashion, so that we can cross your name off our "Broken Fences List." Due to snow and storms, there are also many trees and branches which need to be cleaned up and removed. Remember, everyone's curb appeal combined, equals an appealing Village for all of us. We appreciate you doing your share. Thank you.

A Message From Your Mayor Daniel H. Serota



Hello Neighbors and Friends —

February was an incredible month for weather here in Brookville. March? Well, not so good. Nor'easter Riley wreaked havoc and left us with downed trees and power lines, overturned cars, closed roads — even a fire on Wheatley. Over 450 residents lost electricity, and some were without power for over 30 hours.

Tim Dougherty and our road crew worked all weekend to cleanup, clear roads and coordinate with PSEG to get power restored. But that wasn't to be the end of the story... A few days later and yet another nor'easter. Heavy wet snow and icy conditions, but in many ways we dodged a bullet.

However bad the weather, it doesn't stop us from our appointed rounds when it comes to the Budget. As we work to finalize numbers for FY June 1, 2018 – May 31, 2019, I am pleased to report that the state of our Village is sound and that there will be no tax rate hike again this year. (See P2.)

As I look ahead to our new fiscal year, here's what we have planned:

The 2018 Road Resurfacing & Repair program has begun with an engineering review. More roads will be resurfaced during the Summer. (For

Last year, at Mayor Serota's Inauguration Event, we asked all attending residents to vote on the new design of signage for our streets.

This new sign will replace all of the vertical green, white & gold posts that currently mark our streets.

Our first prototype sign has been placed at the corner of Old Wheatley & Horse Hill Roads.

In order to meet NYS signage regulations, there still has to be a few minor adjustments.

Installation should start this Summer and roll out through 2019.

GOOD NEWS!!

NO INCREASE FOR TAX RATE BASE ANTICIPATED.

Voting for the Village budget takes place at our Annual Organizational Meeting in April. Assuming this balanced budget passes, the rate base for Village taxes will remain the same as last year... meaning no increase in taxes unless your assessed value has changed.



Property Tax Bills for the 2018 Village Real Estate Taxes will be mailed to all residents on or about **June 1, 2018** and are due without penalties no later than **July 1, 2018**.

Get Ready For Spring With The Brookville Park Foundation ...

Did you know that the Brookville Park Foundation was created in 1981 for the purpose of "beautifying the highways and byways" of Brookville, including our Brookville Nature Park? Did you know that all the work they do to "Keep Brookville Beautiful" is done by volunteers? And did you know that all of the flowers and beds throughout the Village are supported by private donations?

Brookville is beautiful. But there is something extra special that we all get to share in because of the work of the many volunteers from the Brookville Park Foundation (BPF).

Starting early next month, watch for their magic! There are 10 large flower beds along our roads that are planted, maintained, and irrigated by the BPF, including the two triangles at the intersection of Route 107 & Wheatley Road, the corner of Fruitledge & 107, and their newest bed on Brookville Road and Route 106 as you turn into our Village.

In less than a month, there will be daffodils everywhere, at the south entrance to Brookville on Route 107 as well as the hillside north of Fruitledge and a mass of daffies and day lilies just north of that. Other beds will have orange and yellow tulips with a showing of pansies. Brookville's beauty is literally the envy of our bordering villages.

So this Spring, as you drive through the Village, please enjoy the flower "show." And remember that all of the beds are supported by private donations — they are not paid for by the Village or funded by our taxes. Update on our Village LED Street Lights!

Technology has changed a lot in the last 75 years, and that includes street lights. Today, most state, county and village roads around New York are being updated with LED lights because they are brighter and more cost efficient. Now, Brookville will be no exception.

Our Village owns and maintains 92 street lights on both local and on some State roads. Most of these lights have been functioning for over 70 years!!

For the past two years, we have been replacing Village street lights needing repair with Verdeon LED roadway luminaire fixtures. Not only do they combine optical performance and energy efficiency to meet all the new roadway requirements, but they cast more light, last longer and cost less to run.

For 2018, we budgeted to replace the balance of our old lights with the new LED lights. Over the next few months, we will be converting to the new technology. By end of summer, we expect to have completed the conversion.


FOUR VILLAGE ROADS READY FOR REPAIRS

The 2018 Road Project will commence as soon as a sealed public bid to repair and repave four of our Village roads has been received and verified. Road work is anticipated to begin this summer and to be completed soon thereafter. Roads scheduled for work are shown here and described below:

- Wenwood Drive: Cowpath to Brookville Lane South – approximately 2700 ft: Curb replacement, repairs, milling & paving.
- Ivy Court: Minor curb repair, milling and paving the full length of the road.
- Brookville Lane South: Repairs, milling and paving the full length of the road.
- Hemlock Drive: Quaker Ridge to the west for approximately 1100 ft. – repairs, milling & paving. Edge control recommended on south side.

Wind, rain, sleet and snow pounded Brookville on Friday evening into Saturday, March 2-3, 2018 as Nor'easter Riley unleashed its fury. Shortly after 5pm, all hell broke loose: Old Wheatley Road was closed at Rte.107 as an enormous pine tree pulled down electric wires... Fruitledge was closed with an overturned car ... and parts of Wheatley were shut down from an electric fire near Rolling Drive... Havoc continued into the early hours of Saturday with the closing of Rte 107 north of Fruitledge when a wind gust overturned a car which in turn hit a pole and took down more electric wires. Some residents didn't get power back until Sunday evening. One thing for sure, the Old Brookville Police had their hands full.

PERSONNEL CHANGES & OTHER OBPD UPDATES



PO Anthony Sgueglia joins the OBPD from the NYPD

The Old Brookville Police Department recently announced the hiring of a new police officer. Police Officer Anthony Sgueglia, 24 years old, formerly with the New York Police Department for two years, was appointed to the OBPD on February 1, 2018. He is the 11th new police officer hired since 2015. P.O. Sgueglia will be replacing Police Officer Andy Foley who will be retiring at the end of the month after 20 years of police service. The Village of Brookville would like to thank Officer Foley for his years of dedicated service and welcome Officer Sgueglia to our police force.

In the last three years, there has been an unprecedented loss of many experienced officers who reached retirement age. Some of these retirees had patrolled our Village for over 30 years. So it wasn't just a loss of personnel, but a loss of officers we all knew and liked.

Last year we hired five new recruits to replace retirees from 2016/2017. Each of these new hires had previously served in the NYPD. Chief of Police Richard Smith, who regularly reports to our Mayor and Police Commissioner, has informed us that the Department continues to provide these new police officers with the tools and additional training necessary in order to maintain the high standards and professionalism that we have come to expect from our police department and that each of the new hires has been performing well.

Chief Smith understands that while his patrol force has been extremely successful in keeping our Village safe and reducing crime over these past six years, crime is primarily driven by a complex mix of social and demographic factors.

The Department will face several challenges in the year ahead which will include the ever

COMMUNITY NOTIFICATION ENROLLMENT

INTRODUCING CodeRED — A BROOKVILLE-SPECIFIC NOTIFICATION SYSTEM FOR ALERTS AND TIME-SENSITIVE MESSAGES.

Mayor Daniel H. Serota, and the Board of Trustees are pleased to announce that we have entered into a three-year test period agreement with OnSolve, a company that uses location-based methodology to deliver special messaging and alerts for those participating in the CodeRed system.

“With CodeRED, Brookville will be able to expand its communication channels so that we will have an independence from the Town and County as we reach out to residents. This will allow us to concentrate on our needs through specific alerts and time-sensitive messages when needed,” said Mayor Dan Serota. “Furthermore, we can contact residents from anywhere or at anytime, and we expect the system to be up and running by the second half of the year,” the Mayor said.

There will be two types of CodeRED announcements for our Village:

1. Emergency Notices (Snow plow schedule by street, boil water alert, water main break, gas leak, missing child, accidents, etc.)
2. General Announcements (Spraying for mosquitoes, Village events, Election notices, etc.)

According to Robert D. Spina, Director of Brookville's Emergency Management, Brookville will be using both of these types of notifications. He also stressed that our Village will NOT be using CodeRED to duplicate the more general weather watches and warnings that come from Nassau County and Town of Oyster Bay. “We will use CodeRed for watches and warnings specific to our Village (such as the power outages recently encountered on Old Wheatley and Horse Hill Roads,” Spina said.

“Once in place, we will have the ability to provide residents with information and updates almost as quickly as they happen,” Mr. Spina continued. “The company-owned redundant data centers help ensure that any data is safe and that messages will be delivered to our residents within minutes. This is a great addition for our Village — especially in these changing times,” Spina said.


When this system is set up, residents will be able to register for CodeRED Alerts directly through a link on our website.

Registration for this notification service will be customized, allowing residents to choose which alerts they'd like to sign up for and their preferred manner of receipt, including landline, cell, email, text, TTY, or a combination. Residents may sign up just for the Emergency Notices or for both types of announcements. The choice will be yours. “We expect the system to be up and running by the second half of this year and ready for residents to register,” Spina stated.

Additionally, residents can keep track of alerts with the CodeRED Mobile App which notifies smart phone holders of real-time alerts for a yearly subscription charge of 99c. Similar to the online registration, users choose which notifications they want to receive via the App.

“This will provide us with an enhanced ability to issue general and/or emergency messages for Brookville from any location,” said Mayor Serota. “This would have been extremely helpful during SuperStorm Sandy and more recently, with Nor'easter Riley when we had power outages, accidents, fire and many other problems specific to Brookville.

Our June 2018 issue will provide more details and FAQ on how to register for CodeRed.

JWD WATER TOWER UPDATE

During the latter half of 2017, the Jericho Water District's Wheatley Rd. well/tank property underwent critical site improvements as phase one of the Wheatley Tank replacement project. The existing 10" cast iron water main, on the property, was replaced with a new 16", ductile iron water main. Along with the installation of the new water main, the control and security system wiring were also replaced. These improvements were made because the existing pipe and cables were undersized, and their current location would be in the way of the new elevated storage tank.

On January 12th, 2018, bids for the construction of the new 1.5-million-gallon elevated water storage tank, and the demolition of the existing tank, were accepted and opened.

Four (4) bids were received, with Caldwell Tank, of Louisville, KY, the lowest responsible bidder. The District's engineers, H2M Group, reviewed all 4 bids, and based on their findings, recommended that Caldwell Tank be awarded the contract to construct the new tank and demolish the old one. Once the contracts have been signed, the work is anticipated to start this spring.
